The speakers spoke of the need for blood, sometimes up to 50 units for emergencies and surgeries. Blood has a maximum shelf life of five days. There is an aging donor base, so younger donors are needed, especially males of various ethnic backgrounds. You need a doctor's clearance if donating for the first time after age 61. There are 43 permanent sites across Canada with 25,000 clinics. You can donate whole blood, or platelets, plasma, stem cells, etc. To donate, call 1-800-2donate.
