**Atlantic Regional Meeting:** Robert Taylor gave a brief report of the meeting held in Halifax on October 4<sup>th</sup>. Reports and ideas were shared among Clubs. The importance of good topics combined with good speakers in order to attract and keep members interested, was stressed.

**Member Profile:** Ron Bunn confessed himself to be old enough to have been born “under the dome” of the old General Hospital. His career was in accounting and software programming.

**Finances:** Treasurer Don Mitchener reported that dues for this year are coming in, and we have about \$1800 in the bank. There is \$24 owing to the Boys and Girls Club re the anniversary lunch last month, and Robert Taylor submitted a bill for \$189 for expenses of the Atlantic Regional meeting.

**Nominations Committee:** Brian Mitchell reported the committee is still seeking a President and a Vice President.

**Phone Committee:** Gordon Graham asked members to keep him notified of changes in address, phone number, or e-mail so as to be able to receive information re Club activities.

**Guest Speaker:** Willard Buckley introduced David Nickerson, President of the St. Andrews Society, who also spoke to the Ladies Probud Club yesterday. David was with the Telegraph Journal as a photographer, and is now a Preplanning Counsellor with Brennan’s. The Saint John branch of St. Andrews Society is the oldest in Canada, established in 1798. It has produced many political and business and professional leaders over the years. Present membership is about 130 men; several Past Presidents were present, along with incoming President Laurie Hossack. The Society sponsors St. Andrew’s House in Millidgeville. Their two main functions are the St. Andrews Day dinner on November 30<sup>th</sup> and the Robbie Burns Night on January 25<sup>th</sup>, to which ladies are invited. They make regular donations to the Saint John Regional Library and the Saint John & St. Stephen Home. David had with him the President’s chain of office, the President’s Chair which was hand-carved in 1908 and on which Prince Charles sat during his recent visit, and several tartans.
