Note: As information is finalized, that information of the PROBUS Club 30th Anniversary, will be sent out in plenty of time.


PROBUS OUTINGS

display, shown in a giant glass tube starting on the floor. It represents the height of the tides in the Bay Funday and shows at what level different fish species occupy.


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





These fish at mid level are **Alewife/Gaspereau**

These are Speckled Trout in a display. Healthy specimens.



Young Sturgeon about three feet long, occupy the bottom of any body of water.



This fish is called **"SEA RAVEN"** and occupies the bottom of any water. When hungry, according to the poster information, will eat anything around. Not the prettiest fish but serves a purpose in the system.





There were three seals in a stand alone encloser tank. The unusual thing was the seal would swim to the left side of the tank, dive and reappear on the right side of the tank. By doing this, as the picture shows, swim, or glide upside down. Very repetitive motion in all the time I was there. Smooth swimmer for sure.


I wonder if that is where the current submarine design comes from?


